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INTRODUCING EDUQAS GCSE FRENCH

Your Eduqas French GCSE is split into three main themes:

- IDENTITY AND CULTURE
- LOCAL, NATIONAL, INTERNATIONAL AND GLOBAL AREAS OF INTEREST
- CURRENT AND FUTURE STUDY AND EMPLOYMENT

Your four French exams (SPEAKING, LISTENING, READING and WRITING) will cover these three themes equally. Each exam is worth 25% of your final grade. You are not allowed to use a dictionary in any exam.

Now for the confusing bit! Each of these three themes has three sub-themes which are divided into two sections each. These sections are all of equal importance – so don't spend all of your time concentrating on your favourites! Make sure you revise all the topics equally.

TRANSLATION TIPS

ENGLISH TO FRENCH

- Don't translate sentences word for word!
- Check you are correctly translating the tense required.

FRENCH TO ENGLISH

- Don't translate the text word for word you don't need to have the same number of words in your translation as the original text has.
- Don't miss out little but important words e.g. very, often, never.
- Make sure you translate the correct meaning
 of the tense e.g. I play, I played, I will play, I
 would play. Sometimes keywords and phrases –
 like yesterday, in the future, later, usually will
 help you to identify the tense.

Décris ta famille.

Describe your family.

J'ai une sœur qui s'appelle Sophie. Je m'entends bien avec elle parce qu'on aime la même musique. Elle est toujours amusante. J'ai aussi un frère qui est plus vieux que moi. Je pense que mes parents sont trop stricts et c'est vraiment énervant.

I have a sister called Sophie. I get on well with her because we like the same music. She is always funny. I also have a brother who is older than me. I think that my parents are too strict and that's really annoying.

Qu'est-ce que tu as fait avec tes amis le weekend dernier ?

What did you do with your friends last weekend?

Vendredi dernier, je suis allé(e) au cinéma avec mes copains de classe. Après avoir vu le film, nous sommes allés au restaurant. Nous avons mangé une pizza.

Last Friday I went to the cinema with my friends from school. After watching the film we went to a restaurant. We ate pizza.

La mode, c'est important pour toi ? Is fashion important to you?

Oui, bien sûr. Je m'inspire des mannequins et des célébrités et j'adore acheter des vêtements. Plus tard, je voudrais travailler dans l'industrie de la mode.

Yes, of course. I'm inspired by models and celebrities and I love buying clothes. Later, I'd like to work in the fashion industry.

Est-ce qu'il y a une célébrité que tu admires ? Pourquoi ? Is there a celebrity who you admire? Why?

J'admire Ed Sheeran parce qu'il chante bien. L'année dernière j'ai assisté à son concert. C'était fantastique.

I admire Ed Sheeran because he sings well. Last year I went to his concert. It was great.

Comment serait ton petit ami/ta petite amie idéal(e)? What would your ideal boyfriend/girlfriend be like?

> Il/elle aurait un bon travail et il/elle serait riche et généreux/ généreuse. À mon avis, avoir le sens de l'humour est important aussi.

> He/she would have a good job and be rich and generous. In my opinion, it's important to have a sense of humour.



Try to use a variety of vocabulary and structures.

There's no need (and you won't have enough time) to describe the colour of every member of your family's hair, eyes, etc. The vocabulary you will be using could become really repetitive.

It's easy for this topic to become too descriptive and rely mainly on present tense. Try to include some opinions - what do you think of different family members? How do you get on? Why?

Say what you did/are going to do with your family to show off your use of different tenses.





There are three important points to remember about adjectives in French:

- 1. Check the ending of the adjective. Is it singular (e.g. le garçon intelligent) or plural (e.g. les garçons intelligents)?
- 2. Check the adjective is in the right place. Most adjectives go after the noun in French (be careful – there are some exceptions!).
- 3. Check the agreement of the adjective. Is the noun masculine (e.g. le garçon intelligent) or feminine (e.g. la fille intelligente)?

Je me dispute souvent avec mes parents. I often argue with my parents.

Il/Elle me critique tout le temps. He/She criticises me all the time.
